

Researching Chinese Australian family history in Victoria

inding Marriage Licences in Findmypast

A Library Assistant recently told me (Gail White) about the Marriage Licences available on Findmypast. This led me to investigate exactly what they had in the collection. I thought it was worth sharing with other members who may not know about them.

In FMP, you need to select the **Search tab** at the top of the home page, then select **Search All Databases**. Type the word '**licences**' into the search box and you will see quite a few databases that may be of interest to you. You could be more specific if you like and use the search term '**marriage licences**', but I like to see what comes up because you never know what may be of interest.

For instance, *Ireland Dog License Registration*! Or this one –*Britain, Register of soldiers taking the oath of allegiance and register of licences of persons to pass beyond the seas*, 1573-1677.

Marriage licences are important because they may contain more information than the parish register entry, or replace a missing entry. Licences were purchased by people intending to marry who wanted to avoid the inconvenience of banns being called on three Sundays in their parish church. Most people who could afford the fee married by licence, which was obtained from the diocese in which one of the parties lived. FMP has the following databases, some with images, some only an index. Examples are shown below.

Britain, Marriage Licences comprises licences obtained in Bedfordshire, Devon, Gloucestershire, Hampshire, Kent, Lancashire, Lincolnshire, London, Middlesex, Norfolk, Nottinghamshire, Somerset, Suffolk, Surrey, Worcestershire, and Yorkshire. Most of the records were created from a mixture of handwritten and typed record books from 1115 until 1906. It is possible to view all the volumes covered by clicking on a link at the bottom of the first search page.

Paynter, Francis, of St. Earth, Cornwall, gent., bachelor, about 27, and Mrs. Margaret Powlett, of St. Clement Danes, spinster, about 19, consent of her friends—at Clapham, Surrey, or Fulham, Middlesex. 19 July, 1670.

This example includes the ages of the two parties, information not provided in the parish register.

Vicar General Marriage Licences and Faculty Office Marriage Licences

These two indexes comprise transcripts of marriage licences which were applied for to the Vicar General or the Faculty Office, covering the Diocese of Canterbury between 1694 and 1850. This Diocese covered a large part of south-eastern England.

You can order copies of the original documents from the Society of Genealogists for £15 including postage. Upon receipt of your payment, the Society of Genealogists will locate, copy and send you a copy of the record.

<u>https://www.perthtas.com/perth-history</u> - by the 1830s there were 200 convicts at Perth Probation Station (Tasmania) engaged in building he main road and the first Perth Bridge. There were houses, hotels, flour mills, a general store, brewery, churches, school/post office and police station. From 'Discover Australia'.

https://familytreemagazine.com/general-genealogy - tracing your family medical history through genealogy can not only put you in touch with your past – it might save your life. From 'Family Tree Magazine'.

https://assets.publishing.service.gov.uk/media - the General Register Office (GRO) in Southport is a Guide to Birth Certificates and holds comprehensive records of all births recorded in England and Wales. A time of birth, in addition to the date of birth, is only put down to indicate that this is a multiple birth, whether twin, triplet or more. Mentioned in a Crime novel, and checked on 'Google'.

https://www.familysearch.org/img_aut.php - some records of the East India Company (1709-1871) of the Poplar Fund are held in the Bancroft Library Borough of Tower Hamlets, London. There is lots of reading here. Found in the Journal of the Families in British India Society. (FIBIS).

https://www.ffhs.org.uk – the Federation of Family History Societies (FFHS) is the international umbrella organisation for such bodies, encompassing 219 societies representing 300,000 members. It was founded in 1974, is world-wide in scope, and aims to co-ordinate and assist the work of societies or other bodies interested in Family History, Genealogy and Heraldry. There is an alphabetical list which includes Australian sites. From the 2019 Booklet, and updated.

https://www.earlymodernweb.org.uk – the intention of these pages is to bring together a wide range of online resources for the early modern period, which covers the period roughly from 1500-1800 (sometimes earlier, sometimes a little later). There is a table of contents plus a site index. From an old copy of 'Practical Family History'.

<u>https://www.northyorks.gov.uk/local-libraries/scar</u> - Scarborough Library, North Yorkshire gives access to many things, including family history, subscription sites, internet and computer access, newspapers and much more. From a copy of 'Family Tree' magazine.

https://www.familysearch.org/wiki/Wales Parish in 1538 Thomas Cromwell ordered that every parish should keep a record of every baptism, marriage and burial. The details that are included within the registers vary from parish to parish, and from clerk to clerk, and many registers from the early period have not survived. Some parishes did not start keeping registers until as late as 1598. From an old copy of 'Glamorgan Family History Society'.

https://www.museumoflondon.org.uk – it tells the story of the East End and its connection with the Thames throughout history. 
